## The Spicery Promoting Tea Experiences for Nearly Four Decades In Historic Downtown Glendale



The Spicery Tearoom located in Historic Downtown Glendale has been providing tea experiences for nearly forty years. Husband and wife team, Bud and Lorraine Zomok, along with their dear friend Sue Berntsen are the third owners of the tearoom. They purchased the restaurant in the summer of 2022 from a lifelong friend of Bud, Matt Borowski who retired after owning the Tearoom for ten years.

The Zomoks are long-time Glendale residents and live in a century-old home in the Historic Catlin Court residential neighborhood. They also own **Memory Lane Trinkets and Treasures** located at 5836 W. Palmaire Avenue adjacent to **The Spicery**. Sue Berntsen is also a long-time Glendale resident and has spent many years volunteering for various community organizations in Glendale.

"We are honored to be the owners of this treasured and iconic restaurant and to keep the four decades of history alive," said Lorraine Zomok. Many of the previous employees have returned, including the talented chefs and experienced wait staff. Numerous remodeling projects were completed this past year while keeping the integrity of the historic building intact. The building has a fresh coat of beautiful blue paint and a new roof. The patio has been remodeled with blooming

plants, fruits and vegetables and lovely patio furniture. The patio also features a "Teacup Trellis." The trellis is home to charming teacups that might have a small crack or chip but still are beautiful. Guests are invited to write messages on the teacups which are displayed on the iron trellis.

The teahouse offers seating in the former dining room, library, and various bedrooms

She said, "I have always had a passion for tea and, ever since childhood, making tea was a part of my life. In my opinion, everything in life seems better with a good strong cup of tea in hand and perhaps a warm scone with lashings of jam and Devon cream." She continued, "When I immigrated to America and arrived in Arizona, it was a bit of a challenge for an English girl to find a decent cup of tea. It soon became clear I needed to open my own tea room in my new hometown of Carefree."

And what a great idea it has turned out to be since English Rose Tea Room has been regularly voted Best Place for afternoon tea in the Valley! The recent remodel of the tea room has transformed the interior into an "instagrammable" space with hundreds of roses in every direction.



The Semi-Annual **Phoenix Militaria & Antique Gun Show** will be held on Saturday, May 25th, at the Phoenix Shrine Auditorium. Located at 552 North 40th Street. Hours are from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and admission is \$8 with free parking.

Attendees will be able to buy, sell, trade and swap historical military and collectible items of all types and from all eras. This is always a fun show where you can spend time with old friends as well as making new ones!

More than 130 tables of merchandise will offer a wide variety, including: Medals, Badges, Insignia, Uniforms, Helmets, Knives, Bayonets, Swords, Field Gear, Flags, Documents, Photos and much more. Although there is usually a range of historical origins, the greatest number of souvenirs are typically from the U.S., Germany, Japan and Vietnam, particularly WWI, WWII, and the Vietnam War. Only antique guns, pre-1898, are allowed and no ammunition or modern guns are permitted.

as well as on the patio when weather permits. The kitchen is the heart of the establishment where the menu is reminiscent of a time when you added a pinch of this and a dash of that to evoke memories of satisfying comfortable meals shared among friends and loved ones.

The menus change daily and reflect local variations that integrate historical signature flavors of apricots, citrus, dates, figs, grapes, pecans and strawberries. Guests can enjoy timeless lunchtime favorites like chicken and tuna salad or ham and honey mustard sandwiches and all are served on or with homemade rolls that are baked daily. Specialty salads, quiche, soups and daily specials are also offered. Delicious desserts include the specialty of the house pineapple walnut cake and classics such as chocolate fudge cake, bread pudding, cherry cheesecake and cream puffs. Fine teas are always available, hot or iced. Martha Campbell's iconic menu will remain the same for guests to enjoy for years to come

Listed on the National Registry of Historic Places, the house was built in 1895 by Victor and Lilly Messenger. Located in one of Glendale's first neighborhoods, the building is a stunning example of Victorian style architecture. The Messengers were very active in Glendale which was incorporated in 1910. Victor was the first Town clerk, and the couple donated the first 400 books to start the Glendale Library system. In 1936 Harold and Mae Brewster purchased the home and raised four sons. The Brewsters planted citrus and pecan trees and Mae planted the original roses and a Victory Garden.


In 1987 the Brewster sons sold their childhood home to Martha Campbell who had moved to Glendale in 1936 with her parents at age four. This treasured dining destination then began when Martha opened the establishment, one of Arizona's first tearooms, Campbell restored the historic 1895 Messenger-Brewster home to a bustling happy place filled with the aroma of baking bread and the clink of porcelain teacups and silver.

**The Spicery** is open Monday through Saturday. Lunch is served from 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and reservations are suggested. The three-course tea experience is fresh baked daily and is served from 11 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. with a two-day advance reservation. Dietary accommodation is available for vegetarian and gluten free guests. Special events are planned throughout the year including art classes, charity events, educational workshops and themed specialty teas on select Saturdays and Sundays.

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#### Feeling Lucky?

Do you frequent thrift stores, estate sales, antique shops, and the like? I have been known to visit a variety of places where goods are resold. Generally, I am in search of vintage linens. I am drawn to chemical lace doilies, linens with well-wrought embroidery and anything textile I can envision upcycling. My linen closet contains a large box chock full of lovelies that I consult when planning a new sewing project.

Most thrift shops, at least in my geography, are run to support the work of a charity. The items found for sale are generally donated by the public and resold to support the work of the charity running the shop. In addition to buying, I am also a donor. A couple of times a year, I purge clothing and housewares, gather up the things that no longer fit or I will no longer use and deliver them to the charity shop.

My social media feed shows me lots of videos with a "Go Thrifting with Me" theme. In the videos, some shoppers show you what they found and how they styled it. Some are resellers, showing you what they found, what they paid, and how much it fetched upon resale. Some folks are just happy to have found their "white whale."

It is fascinating to me that some of these shoppers make a full-time living visiting thrifts and reselling their finds. While that might sound like fun, I believe that anything done with daily repetition for income stops being fun and becomes work. I would worry that the "good stuff" would run out, or items I chose would not sell and I would be staring starvation in the face! But I am envious of some of the things people find, whether it's to resell or for their own use. Is it just a matter of luck or dedicated pursuit? Whatever it is, I have been feeling a pull to go thrifting.

My son-in-law works for a nonprofit organization that runs a thrift store as a social enterprise. Their clients staff the shop to gain recent work experience. He asked me if I would make this shop the recipient of our donations. This week, on my first-time visit, I dropped off a trunk full of things. While there, I thought I would see what the shop had for sale.

I spotted a lovely, white porcelain trinket box with cherubs in bas relief. Markings identified it as made by Limoges in France. It was in pristine condition and priced at just \$4. I snatched it up thinking that, if nothing else, it would make a lovely gift.

I thought this item might be worth quite a bit more than the \$4 I paid. At home, we snapped a photo and used item identifier software to discover the same boxes were selling for between \$150 and \$200! I think this was just incredible luck, especially on a first-time visit. How lucky do you feel? Go thrifting with me?

#### Spring into TEA

I grew up on a dairy farm in Blaine, Washington where my mother served afternoon coffee and fresh homemade zwieback (yeast double buns) on Sunday afternoons. This German Russian tradition was called *faspa*. Often friends dropped in unannounced during that time. Mother would quickly set out a spread of sliced cheese, meats, rolls, home-canned fruit and sweets to serve them.

My parents' hospitality made an impression. I enjoyed these spur-of-the-moment visits with church folks and wanted to follow my mother's example.

#### Hospitali-TEA

Years later, when a friend gave me If Teacups Could Talk by Emilie Barnes, I became inspired to invite family and friends for a cup of tea. Since I was also just beginning to write for a publication, I decided to write a column I entitled, "A Cup of Tea with Lydia." When I told my writing mentor about my idea for a tea column, she said, "That would bore me to tears."

It hasn't bored me to tears. Now decades later, I still enjoy going out for tea, serving tea to others and writing this tea column. I hope you enjoy the column too.

A friend asked me, "How do you keep coming up with ideas to write about?"

"I just keep serving tea," I replied. I don't usually plan for teatime to have a topic for the column. But often after serving guests, I realize, "This could make a good tea column." The tea party inspires the column, not the reverse.

#### Impromptu Teas

If teacups could talk, mine would have many stories to tell. Like what happened a month ago when my granddaughters (13 and 20) planned to stop by. "Would you like to come for tea?" I asked. And they did.

Without much time to prepare, I planned a menu around the food I had on hand. I made crustless cucumber-and-cream cheese sandwiches, scone blossoms from my cookbook In the Kitchen with Grandma and served sweets from my freezer.

Placemats, floral teacups and saucers and a three-tier plate stand filled with food welcomed them to the table. The bottom plate held fresh-baked scones, Norwegian krumkake, and cookies. On the side, homemade whipped cream, jam and lemon curd accompanied the scones. The middle plate held the sandwiches and edible small trees for a garnish. A slice of summer sausage was the tree base, thin cucumber slices were folded back and forth for the tree, with a cheese star on top—all held together with a toothpick. The smaller top plate contained cupcake liners filled with fresh raspberries and small chunks of melon.

They each had their own small pot of a favorite herbal tea—Country Peach Passion—and the three-tier stand rested on the table between them. What a delightful way to spend an impromptu visit! Now my teacups have another story to tell.

Spring is a lovely season to share tea. How about an Easter brunch, a St. Patrick's Day par-tea, or a Mother's Day teatime? Or perhaps you have a birthday or shower to celebrate. #### From Lydia's Recipe File: Spring Pretzel Flowers

Colorful and easy to make.

Gather:

Pretzels (square-shaped, called snaps)

White vanilla candy melts Pastel M&Ms Make:

- 1. Place one candy melt on each pretzel.
- 2. Heat a few at a time in the microwave to soften, not melt (time varies, but check every 15 seconds)
- 3. Remove from the microwave. Place an M&M in the center of each candy with the M side down.
  - 4. Add 5 or 6 candies of another color around the center as petals of a flower.

5. Chill to harden the candy melt.

Make as many as you need, at least two per person. Variation: Use round crackers or cookies (e. g. shortbread) as the base. Spread with ready-made vanilla icing. Add M&Ms.

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
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

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
#### The Story of Glowing Glass

by Rica Ketcham Glass that glows under Ultraviolet light has become one of the most popular trends in glass collecting today. While all glass contains a combination of elements, "Glow Glass" contains specific elements such as Uranium, Cadmium, Selenium and Manganese which fluoresce, or emit light at a specific wavelength, under a blacklight - glowing green, yellow, orange, pink, blue and blueish purple. Different elements glow best under different wavelengths of UV light, with the most popular being 365nm. A variety of fluorescent and LED blacklights are available at local hardware stores and online.

Uranium was initially added to the glass-making process in the 1830s to create a brilliant green-yellowish hue in daylight. As this glass grew in popularity, it was combined with other heat-sensitive chemicals to create a yellow glass that was first known as Canary Glass and then "Vaseline Glass: due to its resemblance to the Vaseline brand of petroleum

jelly. It reached the height of popularity during the Victorian period (1880-1920)

Vaseline glass is in the family of Uranium glass, yet there are distinctions between the two. Vaseline glass is yellow or yellowish green in the daylight, while Uranium glass



comes in opaque colors like jadeite, custard, or Burmese glass, but Uranium glass does. United States production of glass containing Uranium ceased during World War II because the government confiscated uranium supplies for the Manhattan Project from 1942 to 1958, but Uranium-based glass production resumed after that. Although Uranium glass does register on a Geiger counter, it is well below everyday "background radiation" or about the same as a cell phone. However, the U.S. EPA recommends not eating or drinking from Uranium glassware.

Manganese Glass dates back to Ancient Egypt and is considered one of the oldest elements added to glass. It was used as a clearing agent to remove the green tint that comes from iron impurities. The presence of Manganese is why clear or marigold glass will glow a dull green color under a blacklight.

Manganese in clear glass, especially antique glass, can also change clear glass to a shade of violet to deep purple with prolonged exposure to UV light, such as direct sunlight. In the glass world, this is known as "Sun-Changed" or Irradiated Glass, and it is considered a sham to deliberately alter the historical artifact by exposing glass to ultraviolet light to create this color. It is important to note that not all purple glass is sunchanged, and many color-fast shades of purple are created by adding specific elements.

Cadmium is added to glass to create a sunset look when exposed to UV light, with colors ranging from a bright yellow to a deep orange and even red. This was discovered in 1817, but there were production delays for the pigment until about 1820 because of the scarcity of the element - which also made it very expensive.

Selenium, similar to manganese, was used as a clearing agent for glass. It is often used in combination with Cadmium, creating a bright pink glow when exposed to UV light. Selenium is also associated with some red glass that will cause an orange glow when exposed to UV light.

The rising topic of these added elements to the glass world has brought about intrigue and new collectors, creating a surge in blacklights used while shopping to find the next piece of glass that unexpectedly glows. Now more than ever, glowing glass is selling fast. Don't forget your blacklight the next time you are out antiquing.

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
















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#### Building Harmony




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#### Art in All the Wrong Places

A fierce late summer storm arrived with sleeting rain, impressive bolts of lightning and booming throbs of thunder. Watching Mother Nature pound everything in her path, I was thankful that the air controllers had prevented our flight from leaving the gate, although it was clear that I wouldn't make my connection in Minneapolis.

Now, as a side note, I will pass along the handy tip that it is always wise to keep an extra change of clothing and necessities in your carry-on luggage. It is excellent advice, which I completely disregarded. I was sure nothing would happen, so four Nancy Drew mysteries that I had purchased at a used bookstore filled my bag. I mean, what could go wrong?

What went wrong is that our full Saturday flight landed in Minneapolis-St. Paul as airlines, shops and restaurants were closing or cleaning up for the night. Even the lighting had been dimmed. So much for lunch in California.

The Minnesota Regional Studio Art Quilts Associates (SAQA) was displaying quilts celebrating the state's waterways. Boats drifted on lakes, birds and dragonflies danced against a backdrop of greens, blues and turquoises of air and water. Shells and beach inhabitants nestled in tufted shorelines. It was all there in colors and designs that were completely out of place in the airport's dreary coldness. But, by their presence, the delicate beauty of the quilts communicated tranquility. That moment of calm broke through the stark ugliness of an environment structured to keep people moving and focused on their next destination.

The exhibit was more than an oasis of beauty, it was a public relations coup, informing visitors and residents that Minnesota's lake shoreline – in their words – is "3.5 times longer than the ocean shorelines of California, Hawaii, and Florida combined." The display achieved results in publicizing the art of quilting, the sponsoring organization and the pieces on display.

What a brilliant idea to bring art to the people in an air terminal! Given that millions of people move through the world's airports, it makes sense to bring art to where they spend some amount of time. Paintings and posters are expected visuals, but fabric arts are a novelty. The tactile quality and artistry of quilts deliver the third dimension that arrests our attention. It's an idea that should be repeated in other unexpected places.

The airport display soothed the frayed edges of a delayed trip but, even for those with no delays, the exhibit nudged people to stop a moment, savor the beauty and take a deep breath before rushing off again to catch their next flight.

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



## Mountain Top Quilt Show in Prescott Valley - May 31 and June 1

**Mountain Top Quilters Guild** will present their biennial quilt show "Every Quilt is a Memory" on May 31 and June 1 at the Findlay Toyota Center, in Prescott Valley. Located at 3201 N Main Street, the event hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday. Admission is \$10 per person, which covers both days, and children 12 and under are free. There is plenty of parking available at the Center.

The Guild expects to have over 400 quilts and quilted items made by Guild members on display during the show. Viewers will be able to vote for their favorite quilts and items based on the categories, Pieced, Applique, Mixed Technique, Art and Other. There will be a special exhibit of Youth quilting and sewing projects.

The Opportunity Quilt drawing takes place on Saturday June 1 at 3 p.m. This year's quilt is titled Desert Diamond and is 92"x92". The quilt was designed and made by members of the Guild. Tickets are \$1.00 each or six for \$5.00. The winner does not have to be present to win and the quilt can be shipped within the U.S. to the winner.

A highlight of the show is "Quilts with a Story," also known as a "quilt turning." This is a wildly popular event and will be offered 4 times, 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. on Friday, and 10 a.m. on Saturday. It features quilts with unique stories and memorable tales about each quilt's history, significance, or purpose. The quilts are loaned to the show by members of the Guild.

More than 15 vendors will be on hand around the arena and include local and regional quilt shops and quilt-related businesses. The vendors will offer quilting and sewing machines as well as the latest tools and beautiful fabrics.

At The Guild's Boutique a large assortment of items to purchase all stitched and handmade by Guild members. There also will be a Small Quilt Auction on Saturday at 2:30 p.m. which showcases smaller quilts and some unique items, such as bags and jackets made by Guild members. The items on auction will be on display from the beginning of the show through the auction.

The Guild's President has issued a challenge to members to display a quilt that is a favorite memory. These quilts will be grouped in a special display. In addition, the Community Quilts program of the Guild issued a challenge with each participant receiving an unknow color/quantity of fabric and challenged to make a quilt. Quilts are presented at the May meeting before the show and voted on by the membership as to which are their favorites. The Community Quilt Challenge quilts will be on display at the show prior to being donated to local charities supported by the Guild.

No food or beverages may be brought into the building. Healthy food and beverages will be available for purchase on site. No food or beverages will be allowed on the exhibit floor.

Proceeds from the Show and the Opportunity Quilt Ticket sale go toward funding the Guild's Community Quilts program and quilting education for members and youth sewing. The Guild makes over 700 quilts each year and the quilts are donated to many charities and services in the quad cities area, including adoption agencies, hospitals, women's shelters, veterans' groups and first responders with a need to comfort a family or child.

Mountain Top Quilters began in 1982 with 15 quilt makers and in September 2012, Mountain Top Quilters Guild was formed. There are now over 200 members involved in all aspects of quilting. Monthly meetings include a variety of speakers and programs, business sessions, fellowship and the promotion of quilting education and activities. The Guild started a Youth Quilting program in 2017 which teaches youths ages 10-18 the skills and techniques of sewing and quilting, helping to pass the art of quilting on to the next generation. Since its early days, the group has continued to grow and reach out to other quilt makers as well as the community. It continues to attain its goal of teaching one another while serving those in need, making a difference in the lives of many people.

At the check-in desk, she was given a ballot to vote for her favorite quilt of the show.

I was so proud of her as she took her voting duty very seriously. As we walked down the aisles looking at all the different quilts, I asked Peyton to write notes for me on the ones I liked. She did the same for the quilts she liked. This particular show had a great variety of quilts with many different techniques that I appreciated. Surprisingly, Peyton seemed interested in the different techniques as I explained them and why I liked each

As we were walking down row 5 or 6, Peyton ran down the aisle and said, very enthusiastically, "This is my favorite!" As she pointed at her "favorite," I realized why she liked it so much. It was a perfect artist interpretation of her dog, an American Bullie named Trout. This quilted wall hanging is a fabric collage made by Barbara Green, Palo Verde Patchers in Sun City West. 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












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

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

 Following the diagram below, piece together like a nine patch. Make four sections




- We're now going to take these four sections and sew them together like a 4 patch, turning them so the dark patches form the center diamond. See Diagram below for guidance.
